We may be combining all of these things but do not forget the real reason for the weekend — the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ; Jesus winning for each of us, through the cross, a way back to God. Taking on himself our sin thus allowing us to have a personal relationship with God our Father. Adam broke faith with God by disobeying him but Jesus through his obedience — even to his death — has won back our way to God. One of the hymns we sing on Easter day says 'death has lost its sting'. Death is for Christians only a gate way to life in eternity. I hope that you can find time to go to church and celebrate the joy of Faster.

death has lost its sting Christians throughout the world will spend the week before Easter, called Holy Week, attending services each day recalling the last week of our Lord's life on earth. Here at All Saints we will have an evening Communion service with reflections on the Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. We celebrate with a Passover meal on the Thursday followed in church by the reading of the gospel of his arrest in the garden of Gethsemane.

Good Friday is time for reflection before the cross at 2-3pm and Holy Saturday at 8pm is the service of Light. This is service with bonfire, sparklers, joyful music and a renewal of our Baptismal vows. Easter Sunday begins with a dawn service on the village green at 6am followed by breakfast in the church hall. However you spend your time over Easter I wish you a blessed, happy and joyous time as we all celebrate the resurrection of Jesus.

Obituary: Tony Edwards

Tony was born at his parents house at Berry Cottage on the corner of Swiss Road and Hambledon Road Waterlooville. One of the many properties owned by his family of local builder and funeral directors was started in 1860 by his Great Grand father.

The family were closely intertwined with the prosperity and development of Waterlooville both before and after the first and second World Wars, originally owning much of what is now Asda and surrounding shops.

Times were hard in the 1930; and like most the family business struggled but Tony's mum was keen for Tony to have a good education. He went to private schools and here Tony excelled in sport and outdoor pursuits but he realised that he was not academically gifted.

Tony left school at 16 and spent time working for Wadham's Garage before being called up to the RAF as a carpenter. After demobilization he joined the family firm and joined in with many of the local activities. Tennis, young conservatives, round table and the Waterlooville Horticultural club. He bred special rabbits which he and his father exhibited across the country.

Ballroom dancing was a passion and Tony would spend time leaning the steps from a dance manual before the young conservative dance. It was at one of these that he met Jose who he married in 1950 at St Georges Church Waterlooville.

The building firm really grew in the 1960s and with help from his parents Tony was able to buy land to develop and build. This growth continued into the 70s and 80s. In 1975 Tony and Jose moved to Pitt Hill House which Tony had built and whilst Jose concentrated on the interior decoration Tony built a wonderfully exuberant and colourful garden.

Tony kept busy not only with the business but with the Cosham Rotary Club, the conservative association and Denmead Communicare. He stopped playing tennis when he was 50 but then took up golf. True to form he addressed the sport with passion and energy becoming the veterans team captain.

Tony was influenced by his mother and was like her kind and generous, and from his father side came his energy, his gregarious nature, humour and occasional short temper. In his inner self he was kind, thoughtful and always positive.

Tony's true abilities as caring and loving husband came to the fore when looking after his beloved Jose in the few years before her death three years ago. He in his own turn was wonderfully looked after by his lovely carers and died peacefully with humour and forbearance in the home he loved.

Q I recently applied for my daughter to attend the same primary school as her older brother. I've heard that in previous years some children have not been able to attend the same school as their siblings. This would be make life very difficult for me as I am a lone parent and I work – what can I do if this happens?

A A school or local education authority can refuse to accept your choice of school. They must give you the reasons for refusal. If this does happen, you could consider choosing another school.

Alternatively, you can appeal to an independent appeal panel. There is usually a time limit on appeals, so be careful not to miss the deadlines. If you believe that discrimination is involved in the decision not to accept your child, make sure you mention this in your complaint.

Denmead Horticultural Society

In February CliffThompson, a member of the British Cactus and Succulent Society gave a fascinating account of his visits to Patagonia in search of cactus. The bleak landscapes dominated by the snow capped Andes varied from volcanic cones to wind eroded sandstone or limestone pavement with embedded fossils. Plants have adapted to this area of low rainfall, snow



covered in winter, by growing low to the ground, some in the shelter of companion bushes, some with deep tubers only producing growth above ground when the conditions are right and some making large mounds which could be hundreds of years old. Cliff showed us many images of the plants with excellent close-ups of the cacti and exquisitely detailed rosulate viola flowers.

In other areas he saw forests of monkey puzzle trees, dense forests with bamboo, areas covered with lupins of all colours and many other familiar plants such as alstroemarias, calceolarias, lilies, gunnera and broom. The quiet roads across the Andes were occasionally obstructed by goats or horses and in Chile Cliff saw magellan penguins, guanaco — a type of llama, rheas and armadillos. His excellent photographs showed us stunning landscapes and plants and animals surviving in extreme conditions.

On Tuesday 1st March the talk is 'Gardening with a thought for nature' by Maggie Haynes. She will tell us about growing fruit, flowers and vegetables using organic and no dig methods at the Tuppenny Barn project's smallholding in Southbourne - 7.30pm at the church hall, visitors (£2) and new members welcome.

The Spring Show is on Saturday 2nd April at the church hall - schedules available in Parkers Hardware and the Community Centre. The show is open from 1pm, awards presented at 4pm. We will be serving teas and there will be plants for sale.
