It's Summer! Holiday time! Assuming we are allowed to have holidays. In former times there was no such thing as an annual holiday, just Public Holidays which were in fact Holy Days celebrating the major Christian festivals with a day off.



When I began work in a London accountant's office it was all very simple. I had to be at my desk and working at 9am sharp, but when the clock struck 5 we all went home. But then came flexi-time. Very helpful for busy people, but not so easy for managers trying to keep tabs on their workforce. Larger companies provided their key employees with a

dedicated mobile phone. It would not turn off and you had to keep it on your person at all times. The distinction between work life and home life became blurred. To get on, you had to prove you were working more hours than other people, regardless of how effectively you were working! Ambition came with a high price tag. Exhaustion. Frustration. Jealousy, Greed, Relationship breakdown. Is it worth it?

It is more about discovering God's purpose

How do we make space? As Christians, we find Sunday morning is the best time to refocus our busy lives. Why do we Go To Church? Focussing on God, even for an hour or two, puts the rest of life into perspective. We discover that work has little to do with money or ambition. It is more about discovering God's purpose for my particular life, learning what abilities He has given me.

When I ran a youth group, I would often pose the question "What would you do if you had enough money never to need to work?" The reply was often "stay in bed". Fine for

one day, maybe two...but then what? Gradually we would discover what the youngsters most liked to spend their time doing. My advice would then be "learn all you can about it, do it really well and people will pay you to do it". Work is about using what God has given us to the best of His ability. When we meet in church, we find it is re-creation. By focussing on the goodness and generosity of God, our part in His plan becomes clearer and our work-life balance is automatically reset

# our part in His plan becomes clearer

Of course, not everyone can be in church on a Sunday, but there are other ways of regaining perspective. Jesus never took a holiday, but then his public working life was only three years! What he did was to deliberately take time out. He would get up early to pray (Mark 1 v 35). He didn't even have an alarm clock to help him!

Housegroups are a great way to make space for God together with a small group of friends. Some churches encourage "prayer triplets" – 3 friends

meeting regularly to pray together. In September there is an opportunity for us to refresh ourselves in the lovely surroundings of Wisdom House in Romsey, where David Lindsay will lead a Quiet Day for us. (sign up at the back of the church). Peace is Jesus' gift to each one of us, but we do need to unwrap it and live it.

May I offer each one of you the Blessing of Peace.

#### Citizens Advice

**Q** I'm about to book our first family holiday abroad but last year friends of mine had terrible trouble cancelling theirs when they found they couldn't go after all – what are my rights?

A Your rights to cancel a holiday (or a particular part of a holiday like a flight or a hotel booking) usually depend on the terms and conditions of your booking, and your reason for wanting to cancel. You might be entitled to cancel the holiday without a cancellation fee if the holiday company changes the holiday or puts the price up after you book.

Check your travel insurance

You might be covered for cancelling a trip if you have travel insurance - check your policy or contact the insurance company if you're not sure.

If you've changed your mind about a holiday or you can't go anymore (eg because of an emergency), you should check the

terms and conditions of your booking to see what your options are. It's likely that you'll either have to pay a cancellation fee or won't be entitled to any refund at all. Contact the company if you can't find your terms and conditions.

You have the legal right to cancel without charge if the company has made 'major changes' to the holiday after you booked it. There's no exact definition for what a major change is.

EXAMPLE: You booked a holiday including a large room at a resort. The company you booked with contacts you to say that your booking has changed to another resort with a smaller room. You can argue that this is a major change. Contact the company you booked with and explain to them why the original booking was important to your circumstances and explain why you think the changes are 'major'. Ask for a refund or to rearrange the holiday.

You have the legal right to get a refund or book a different holiday if the company makes a 'major increase' to the price of the holiday. There's no exact definition for what a major increase is the Association of British Travel Agents suggests that 10% or more is a 'major increase'.



suggests that 10% or more is a 'major increase'. However, this is only a guide.

# Denmead Horticultural Society

Last month John Baker and June Colley's talk gave us an insight into the role of plants in the creation of perfume. Plants developed scent for protection and to attract pollinators although some such as bees are more attracted by flower colour. As well as flowers aromas are found in leaves, ferns, moss, lichens, twigs, citrus zest, seeds, berries, pine resin and roots, iris root being one of the most expensive ingredients. Natural fragrances can be extracted by expression, distillation or with solvents but synthesized copies can also be made.

Perfumes are complex blends of many different ingredients giving the top, middle and base notes which could be floral, citrus, spicy or woody. Rose and jasmine give floral notes, tomato leaves give a fresh green fragrance and lichens have a woody, earthy fragrance. Sometimes less pleasant odours such as civet cat musk, skunk cabbage or dracunculus which smells of rotten flesh are added in

very small quantities to give a perfume a boost.

Our next talk is by Roger Hirons on Design and Redesign in your Garden. He is known as the Plant Doctor and is an expert on plants and garden design with over 20 years of horticultural experience. You may not want to completely redesign your garden but there could be areas that you would like to change or a neglected corner that needs improving — Roger will have lots of ideas. Tuesday 5th July, 7.30pm at the Church Hall. Visitors (£2) and new members welcome.

We don't have a talk in August but are busy preparing for the Denmead Village Show which takes place on Saturday 13th August. Pick up a schedule from Parkers Hardware and whatever your talent you should be able to find a class to enter whether it's growing, baking, making or creating.

# New Vision for Local Government in Hampshire

The Leader of Hampshire County Council, Councillor Roy Perry, announced at the County Council's AGM that before there are any changes in local government structure across Hampshire, whether it be for combined authorities, an elected Mayor or a unitary council, there must be a full and genuine public consultation. We believe that very few residents want a 'Solent City' established and still fewer people who want a 'Metro Mayor' imposed on us.

The County Council has been encouraged to support a bid by Portsmouth and Southampton and some of the Hampshire districts to create a Solent combined authority based on: Southampton, Portsmouth, Eastleigh, Fareham, Gosport, Havant and East Hampshire, and the Isle of Wight, whilst other Districts are proposing a Heart of Hampshire combined authority to cover: Basingstoke and Deane, Hart, Rushmoor, Winchester, Test Valley and the New Forest. Both of those

proposals are based on an elected Mayor with all the expense of elections, and a new layer of administration that would entail. These proposals set a path towards the creation of separate unitary councils. In conclusion, Hampshire County Council will not endorse either the current Solent bid or the Heart of Hampshire proposals unless and until the people of Hampshire indicate that is what they want. The next stage, in a proper democratic process, will be to take these proposals forward in a full public debate so that residents of Hampshire can have their say and determine the future direction of local government. #### Denmead Village Association

In welcoming everyone to the March meeting the Chairman, Peter Ambrose, first introduced the Association's new Secretary and thanked Janet Nobes for performing the duties for some time of both Treasurer and Secretary. He then went on to say that he understood that Winchester Planning Officer has called for a meeting with the Parish Council regarding the test submission by Charles Church for the development at Carpenter's Field. He has asked if he may attend that meeting, but to date has had no response.

He then introduced David Bridges, a National Trust guide at Uppark, who spoke to us about the gardens there. These were started in 1690 by Lord Tankerville. In the 1800s Lancelot "Capability" Brown worked there, and the current layout is attributed to him. The route from London to Portsmouth (now the A3) was developed, and so the entrance to the house was moved from the south to the west of the house to make access easier. In the early 1800s Humphry Repton introduced items in the garden as eyecatchers.

By the 1920s the gardens grew a variety of fruit and vegetables for the house. In the 1930s the textiles of the house were cleaned and refurbished by Lady Featherstonehaugh (pronounced as it is spelled, not as Fanshaw).

In 1989 there was a huge fire and 3,860 dustbins were used for collecting items saved from the house. The house was restored as closely as possible to the original and the current Head Gardener restored the garden to what it was like in 1830-1890, Capability Brown's and Repton's era. The house was given to the National Trust in 1954.

The next meeting of the Association will be the Annual General Meeting, to be held at 7.30pm in All Saints church hall on Friday, I5th
September: All residents are welcome to attend. The membership fee is £2 per year, payable to the Treasurer, Mrs Janet Nobes, 8 The Smithy, Denmead, PO7 6YS, telephone 92 255982. She also has available for sale various items of interest relating to Denmead.
