# Giving something up for Lent?

It's the time of year when people might ask: 'What are you giving up for Lent?' Some of us may reply 'chocolate' or 'alcohol', seeing Lent as an opportunity to improve our health (and waistlines). Others give up something they enjoy in order to help others – for example we may give up our daily coffee on the way to work in order to save the money to help someone less well off than ourselves. Or we may go to a 'hunger lunch' in order to think about those who don't have enough to eat.



Lent has always been a period of self-denial and penance in the Church year – which is why Shrove Tuesday, or Pancake Day comes before Ash Wednesday. On Shrove Tuesday, all the rich foods of the household (such as butter and eggs) would be used up before the Lenten fast.

Traditionally, Lent was also the time of the Church's year when candidates were prepared for their baptism on Easter Day. They would be expected to undertake a period of study and teaching before their baptism. Today, we might go to a study group or focus more on prayer during Lent.

Lent is a time of getting ready for Easter. Churches, including All Saints, look different in Lent. You will notice the colour purple and an absence of flowers and decorations – representing sorrow and penitence. It's a big contrast when Easter Day arrives, when the colourful decorations come out, there's lots of celebration, 'Alleluias' and joyful music!

The 40 days of Lent echo the 40 days that Jesus spent in the wilderness, being tempted and tested to his very limits, in preparation for his earthly ministry. We are told in Luke's account that Jesus 'ate nothing at all during

those days, and when they were over, he was famished.' (Luke 4.2). He must have been sorely tempted to take up the devil's invitation to prove he was indeed God's Son by turning dusty desert stones into bread - but he didn't give in.



This Lent, I'd encourage you to do two things.

Firstly, join with us as we read and study 'Living Faith' by Krish Kandiah. You can either read this book individually at home, or you can join a lent study group and share with others. More information on this book follows on page 7.

Secondly, I'd encourage you to look at www.40acts.org.uk.

Here you will find 'The Generosity Challenge' which launches on the 6th March. You can sign up as an individual and then every day during Lent you'll be sent an email with a short reading,



reflection and a challenge to make a difference. Each challenge is a simple task that encourages us to practise radical generosity as well as spiritual discipline. This is a great resource and can be used with children.



### A Notable Anniversary...

It was 25 years ago, on 12 March 1994, that the first 32 women priests in the Church of England were ordained.



It happened in Bristol Cathedral, and Bishop Barry Rogerson ordained them in alphabetical order; so Angela Berners-Wilson was considered the very first woman to be ordained. The daughter of a priest, she is now chaplain at the University of Bath and Prebendary at Wells Cathedral.

The youngest was Karen MacKinnon, now spiritual care manager at Southampton Hospital.

The legality of the ordination was challenged unsuccessfully in the courts by Anglo-Catholic the Rev Paul Williamson. Ten

years later, one in five priests was a woman.

The first Anglican province to officially permit the ordination of women was Hong Kong and Macao in 1971. Florence Li Tim-Oi had been unofficially ordained there in 1944.

The idea of women priests began to be discussed in the 1920s. In 1978 a meeting chaired by Dame Betty Ridley agreed to set up what eventually became the Movement for the Ordination of Women (MOW).

Of the 542 candidates entering training this year, more than half (274) are women, which is 19 per cent more than last year - a record rise.

## BBC to run a 'Year of Beliefs'

The BBC is going to 'shine a light' on faith and spiritual values in Britain today by running a year of programmes dedicated to religion and ethics.

The move comes a year after the BBC promised to 'raise our game' in the way that it treated religion. That promise followed a year-long review of its religious and ethics output.

So what series should we look out for? Here are just some:

On BBC I, **Earth's Sacred Wonders** will look at the rituals and monuments of faith around the world; Medical Ethics will be a documentary filmed at Great Ormond Street Hospital; and Pregnant and Platonic will be a documentary on people who have children without being in a romantic relationship.

On BBC 2, **Inside the Vatican** will show a year in the life of the Vatican community, including Pope Francis; and the popular Pilgrimage series will return.

The Bishop of Repton, the Rt. Revd. Jan McFarlane, who chairs the Sandford St Martin Trust, welcomed the BBC's plans. Especially "bringing issues of faith, belief and ethics to as wide an audience as possible."

# Rebels with knitting needles

Apparently the young are rebelling again – this time, it seems, against the digital age. A recent study of 18-to-21-year-olds found that 83 per cent prefer to read a printed book rather than a tablet. They are also discovering the joys of knitting, fishing, and fruit picking, doing crosswords, and gardening.

Privilege Insurance, which conducted the research, said it was great to see the younger generation "defy stereotypes and expectations."

Kate Bennett and Eleanor Waterhouse started our year with an excellent talk about their experience of Gardening for Television on the Big Allotment Challenge. When they arrived at the walled garden at Mapledurham House they were given one of nine identical 10m x 12m weed free plots, each with its own greenhouse. The top layer of soil had been removed and replaced with compost and it turned out to be very poor with no worms, not even a slug. They resorted to adding more compost, feeding with lots of tomato fertiliser, SB Plant Invigorator and their secret ingredient: llama poo.

Kate and Eleanor planned their plot with a colour theme and a central feature of sweet peas but were disappointed to find as the series went on that the way contestants grew their crops was less important than the challenges set in each episode. They beat Alex and Ed's giant carrots by digging their entire crop of much smaller roots to find three matching ones, they learnt that they shouldn't have trimmed the roots of their radishes and how to massage their runner beans to make them straight. Most of the flower arranging challenges were new to them and they had to devise their own preserves recipes to avoid copyright problems. Other frustrations were not being able to do anything unless a camera crew was with them, and there was a lot of waiting

However they made it to the final episode having won several Best in Show challenges including dahlias, gladioli, onions and aubergine. They enjoyed their experience although it was hard work and most of what they did to grow the crops was lost in the editing – we all enjoyed their entertaining talk.
