ear Friends,

Blessed with sunshine, comfortable conditions, attractive surroundings, the good company of thousands of people and interesting things to see or to do, we joined with other Christians from south-east Hampshire and the Isle of Wight at The Big Prayer Picnic within the walls of Portchester Castle on Pentecost Sunday (9 June). This half day event rounded-off ten days of prayer and events under the worldwide 'Thy Kingdom Come' initiative, which Emma mentioned in last month's magazine.

The Big Prayer Picnic

In one area of the castle there were fun activities, including face painting, jousting, a rodeo ride and crazy golf, and it wasn't only the young people who were enjoying these! Around the outside of the field, a number of gazebos had been set up, which contained different prayer-based activities and which everyone was welcome to sample. These included: drawing or writing the names of people or situations in need of prayer on pebbles and using them to build a cairn around a cross; writing short prayers on paper, which were folded up in a zig-zag to make wings when passed through paper dove shapes, the winged doves then being hung

from an overhead net on lengths of yarn; writing prayer themes on red, orange or yellow paper 'Holy Spirit' flames to stick onto a frieze. For those to whom drawing or writing didn't appeal there were also prayer activities based on icon painting, monastic chanting and weaving threads.



We gathered to eat our picnics around the All Saints, Denmead banner, which Emma had planted on the ground in the middle of the grassed area inside the castle. Once picnics had been eaten and activities completed, we turned to face the stage and screen and were led through a period of worship, singing and prayer, during which we heard testimonies from people who had recently come to know

Jesus, inspiring us to pray for others to be led to share this experience. We prayed collectively and in small groups, out loud, in silence and using British Sign Language. At the end of the event we were all encouraged to choose five people and to pray for them in particular, to think about what we might say or might give to people to help them to find Jesus, to make personal invitations to people to events and activities during which they might encounter Jesus and for us each to get to know someone better, so that we might be able to have the sorts of conversations with them through which they might learn about Jesus.

And it is important that we do not stop thinking about the themes of Thy Kingdom Come just because Pentecost is over for another year. Sharing the message about God's love and the coming to us of his Holy Spirit remains an ongoing priority, as does prayer. Jesus promised that, "Whatever you ask for in prayer with faith, you will

receive" (Matthew 21:22). St Paul, in his letter to the church in Ephesus, described prayer as a powerful weapon, part of the armour of God which helps us to fight against evil (Ephesians 6:10-20).

be bold and step out in faith

I don't know exactly how prayer works, but it does. It is a mystery, a gift from our loving, forgiving and generous God. Do not be afraid of prayer just because you may not understand it; be bold and step out in faith. If you are unsure what to say, a simple guide may be to pray for anything on our hearts for which we want to say sorry, thank you or please, to God; the Holy Spirit is there to help us with what to say (Mark 13:11). And listen carefully for God's answer; it might not be what we were expecting, or when we expected it. Jesus gave his followers more explicit instructions in how to pray and to persist in prayer (Matthew 6:5-14 and Luke 11:1-13), which is where we find the words which inspired the prayer we know as The Lord's Prayer.

Prayer is a good way to start or to end each day. At all Saints, we meet to say a short (up to 30 minutes) service of Morning Prayer every weekday at 08:30 in the chapel; do come and join us, no previous experience is necessary. With the light mornings, better weather (mostly) and perhaps time off work, school or college that the summer brings, what better time than now to try this out?

Mission Aviation Fellowship

Here at All Saints we support and work in partnership with five missionary organisations. We regularly pray for these mission partners, we receive and send news, support their projects and initiatives, as well as support financially. One of these organisations is the Mission Aviation Fellowship.

In today's 'connected world', the irony is that never have so many people been so isolated. Flying onto desert and jungle airstrips, lakes and rivers, tracks and roads, MAF's light aircraft and their mission pilots go the extra miles to provide a lifeline.

Working in partnership with hundreds of other Christian and relief organisations, MAF enables practical help, physical healing, and spiritual hope to be delivered to many of the most remote and inaccessible communities on the planet. For 70 years, MAF has been flying for life. Here is their latest News Bulletin....

Hope is where the Lord is...

Pilot Jon Cadd and his wife Cher lead the MAF team in Eastern Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). Here Cher shares about how God is working among this community of internally displaced people (IDP) in Bunia's evergrowing refugee settlement.



'Every time I write I feel it is the "same old, same old" - Ebola, violence, need. Ebola is spreading more rapidly than it was a few months ago; militia attacks are getting more dangerous, frequent, and closer to us. The refugees we have been helping are still there and in need of food, shelter, and other very, very basic things.

We of the "western" world think that food, shelter, clothing, medical care, education, and security are "rights" and we expect to have access to all of them during our entire lives. But the people here don't take any of them for granted. Death here is a close and daily reality, often from totally preventable things like malaria, and many in our village remember having to run into the bush to escape the war.



At the Bunia IDP camp we are seeing God at work in the midst of what is, from a logical point of view, a tragedy. The MAF team has been working for a year now to bring food to the people at the camp and hundreds of people, who otherwise might never have heard of God's transforming love for all of us, have accepted Christ as their saviour at MAF's showings of the *Jesus* film there by our chaplain, Bisoke.

'People here smile and praise the Lord, sing, and pray like no people I have ever known. I think they understand more deeply their need of God for absolutely everything in life. And, despite what looks to me like overwhelming burdens of

overwhelming burdens of loss, sorrow, and danger, they consistently say that God will hear and answer their prayers. I have not heard one person here say that God has ever let them down.

We also run a sewing project where many of the women have gone from learning how to sew a simple seam with a needle and thread, to doing embroidery and sewing with the hand machines; enabling them to make their own clothes and items to sell.

'During a recent visit the camp, one of the women shared a prayer request for her child who had been in a coma for weeks in the hospital right beside the camp. The child had made no progress and was completely unresponsive. The MAF team prayed for this child and, later that day, his mother came running to Bisoke's car saying, "My child is well! My child is well!" The boy was awake, responding and even eating!

'So we remember, and count on, the fact that God is in control. Everywhere and in every circumstance. It is never the "same old, same old" to the Lord.'



Fewer of us give to charity

We are giving less time and money to charity than we were two years ago. That is the finding of a recent survey by Charities Aid Foundation (CAF). It found that the proportion of those of us giving money or sponsoring someone has dropped from 69 per cent in 2016 to 65 percent in 2018.

The trend has been described as 'worrying' by the CAF. It comes as figures show that our trust in charities has fallen (from 51 to 48 per cent). Oxfam and Save the Children both attracted negative media coverage after staff were accused of sexual misconduct, while other charities have been accused of chasing vulnerable people.

CAF said that charities now have the challenge of finding ways "to inspire people to give and demonstrate that their money is making a difference."

Winchester Cathedral's Mortuary Chests Unlocked

The secrets hidden within Winchester Cathedral's mortuary chests are gradually being unlocked as part of an on-going research project supported by the Dean and Chapter of Winchester Cathedral.

It has long been believed that the six mortuary chests contain the mortal remains of pre-Conquest kings and bishops, but for many years this has merely been the subject of speculation. A major development in 2015 revealed that the bones were from the late Anglo-Saxon and early Norman periods, thanks to radiocarbon (C14) dating on selected fragments by the Radiocarbon Accelerator Unit at the University of Oxford.

These findings confirmed that the bones date from the same periods as the names on the chests, which include eight kings, two bishops and one queen, rather than being the result of later activity within the Cathedral.

If you own a dog, you won't be surprised to learn you are far more likely to go out walking than your neighbour who doesn't have a dog. (Especially on rainy winter days!)

Now the University of Liverpool has found that 87.3 per cent of us who own dogs exercise for 150 minutes a week, compared with 62.7 of us without dogs. Overall, dog owners are four times more likely to achieve the NHS weekly recommendations for exercise.

At our meeting in June, Andy and Angela Ward of Butterfly Cottage Garden Plants answered our questions on 'Gardening with Native Plants'. They started their nursery in Cheriton over 20 years ago. There is no electricity on site so they work with the seasons to produce their plants growing everything from scratch by seed, cuttings or division. They don't use chemicals relying on natural methods to control pests and have recorded 23 species of butterfly as well as hoverflies, hornets,

> bumble bees, grasshoppers, crickets, lizards, hedgehogs and birds.


Some of Andy and Angela's favourite plants for attracting insects are Valeriana officinalis and members of the carrot. family such as Oenanthe pimpinelloides for hoverflies. Scutellaria altissima and Echium vulgare for bees, Silene nutans for moths and Buddleja for butterflies. Hoverflies, ladybirds and their larvae control aphids so it is important to provide the right plants to attract these beneficial insects as well as the plants to

provide nectar and pollen. Plants we may think of as weeds such as nettles, ivy and

dandelions are all important for beneficial insects and the message was not to be too tidy to give the predators a chance to thrive and control the pests.

Butterfly Cottage is open Thursday, Friday and Saturday except when Andy & Angela are at plant fairs. An appearance on Gardeners World had a dramatic effect on the number of

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people contacting them and coming to the nursery. They don't just grow native plants and there were many lovely healthy looking plants for us to buy. Andy & Angela prove that you can have an attractive garden that is also good for wildlife.

More on 2nd July as Alan Edmonson's talk is on 'Beetles in the Garden – Friend or Foe?' There are more types of beetle than any other insect and Alan will help us sort the goodies from the baddies so we know how to treat them - 7.30pm in the Church Hall, visitors welcome, £2.
