Prison Chaplaincy

As many of you know when I am not in the parish I work 25 hours

per week as a chaplain in HMP Winchester. Winchester Prison is a remand and resettlement prison housing approximately 630 men. The remand prisoners are awaiting court hearings but are deemed to be a risk if left in the community. Resettlement prisoners are awaiting parole hearings or serving the last few weeks of their sentences before their release. This means our population is very transient although we frequently have men staying much longer than they should because there are no places in the appropriate category prison to move them on.

But what do I actually do in the prison as a chaplain?

Well, Chaplains in the prison service have what are known as daily statutory duties.

Firstly they must see all new prisoners who were admitted the day before. We give them a chaplaincy induction explaining what activities are available for them to join if they wish and the kind of personal issues we can help them with. We also check their religious registration is correct and if they require a special diet for religious reasons we are responsible for confirming this and informing the kitchen. We have to visit the Healthcare unit and the Segregation unit each day and speak to each resident individually because we are considered to be impartial and can support them with personal issues.

Then we provide worship and study groups throughout the week and in Winchester the chaplaincy facilitates the Sycamore Tree course. This is a restorative justice course that runs for six weeks during which the men complete a qualification and if they want to can progress on from the course to a point where they might actually have a supervised meeting with their victim/s if appropriate. We provide four of these courses a year.

The main part of our work however is to be available to provide pastoral support to the men, their families and the staff as needed. We provide bereavement counselling, support when a family member is ill or support for those struggling with being in prison for example. Before we can give out any information about a prisoner we must have his consent and before we give any information to a prisoner we have to confirm that what we have been told is authentic This can be very time-consuming and involve many phone calls before we know we are dealing with a genuine situation. Over the years several escape plans have been hatched by men

requesting to attend a family member's funeral when that individual is alive and well.

We also of course impart good news like the birth of a baby. One of my first calls when I started in Winchester was to tell a man that his girlfriend had given birth. Naively I didn't take the girlfriend's name and when I went to inform the prisoner he asked me if I knew which girlfriend it was! I have never made that mistake again.

But by far the worst thing we have to do is inform family face to face when there has been a death in custody. We have a reasonably high number of these situations because we are dealing with men newly admitted to prison or newly sentenced who feel their life is over and there is no future for them. I cannot pretend it is anything but harrowing for the staff, other men on the wing or even sharing the cell and of course the family when this tragedy occurs. support a colleague dealing with a difficult situation.

Chaplaincy days vary a great deal with some days spent doing routine things and attending the regular round of meetings necessary to maintain stability and safety as a priority in the prison. Others are spent answering constant phone calls which frequently bring another problem to solve. Then routine duties are put on hold sometimes until way after what is supposed to be the end of our working day.

In just over six years of being involved in prison chaplaincy the last four of which have been as an employee I can honestly say that while some days are harder than others I have really valued this aspect of my ministry and I am truly thankful I have had the opportunity to experience it. God is in HMP Winchester and I have never felt that there is no hope for the men housed there and I am privileged to be able to share that hope with the men and the staff.

As a team we try to support one another although we come from all different faiths and none. We have team meetings regularly to share any issues that have arisen and we always try to work with at least two of us on duty at any time so we can

To open the November meeting, the Chairman advised that he had little to report except that it looks as though the development at Carpenters Field will probably go ahead in the Spring. Southern Water are running tests with regard to surface water and expect to break through the soil in March/April. They will have to augment the sewage arrangements in order to cope with the additional houses.

He then introduced Roger Clark, our speaker, whose topic was Old Waterways in the South of England. Roger described the evolution of waterways and the way that the natural rivers were used by barges to transport raw materials and finished products between the coast and inland ports. Over the years, canals were built to supplement the river network and make boat movement easier. Thames barges were used all along the East coast, and sometimes to the continent. Up to the 1960s at low tide they were able to settle on the sand or gravel seabed to be loaded or unloaded.

Lewes was a port on the river Ouse, several miles inland. On the river Arun there were wharves and warehouses at Arundel, and because of the difficulty in finding enough wind away from the coast, the barges would be towed by a tug between Littlehampton and Arundel. In 1846 the railway from Arundel to Chichester and Portsmouth was built. Where this crossed the river the rails had to be pushed along the track to allow barges to pass, until eventually, in the early 1930s, a fixed bridge was built at Ford after barge traffic had ceased. The canal age was from the 1750s to the 1840s, by which time steam power took over from waterwheels, and this required coal. As the Industrial Revolution took off, the Duke of Bridgewater who had coal mines in Worsley, needed to transport the coal to Manchester. James Brindley constructed the Bridgewater Canal and he was also asked to supervise the engineering of other canals.



Josiah Wedgwood could see the potential of having a canal to transport his products from the Potteries to the Mersey both quickly and safely and backed the building of the Trent and Mersey Canal. Roger then described the uses of the Wey and Arun canal and the Manchester Ship Canal, which is no longer used for ships and indeed the canal basin in Salford has been re-developed.

Canals are still being restored, but their use today is mainly for pleasure purposes.

• My gym will only allow me to cancel my membership in person. This is written in the contract but I've since moved away from the area. What can I do?

To end your gym membership you will need to follow the terms of the contract. However, it's also possible to challenge any terms which cause unnecessary hassle or are designed to keep you tied into the contract.

For this reason, you could try to challenge the term which states you need to end the contract in person.

Start by writing a letter or email explaining you want to end your membership and why you can't do so in person. If writing a letter, it's best to use recorded delivery so you have proof that the letter arrived.

If the gym won't accept your written cancellation ask if they've got a complaints procedure in place which you can follow. If not, then send another letter giving them a final chance to end the contract.

If they still won't agree to cancelling your contract get in touch with an alternative dispute resolution (ADR) scheme - an independent complaints body which settles disputes. The gym may belong to one already, or should provide details of an approved scheme and say whether they'd be prepared to work with it.

You can also contact the Consumer Service or your nearest Citizens Advice for help on cancelling contracts which include possible unfair terms.

District Council Up-date

Forming of a New Parish Council

Over the past five years the new community known as the West of Waterlooville Major Development Area which is has been built on land in the parishes of Denmead and Southwick wards which are within Winchester City Council. The new development will when completed will consist of over 3,000 properties, a small number of the development is within Havant BC area.

At a meeting of the Licensing and Regulation Committee held in November to move forward a petition submitted under the LGPIH Act. The petition proposes that a new parish be set up by redrawing the boundaries of Denmead and Southwick & Widley parishes such that the entirely of the MDA becomes a new parish. The petition was submitted by the West of Waterlooville Advisory Group which was set up by the two parish councils to help integrate the new communities HBC and WCC residents, Elected member from both authorities have been able to able to attend its meetings.

There will now conduct the Community Governance Review in accordance with the Terms of Reference. Relevant considerations will include the impact on community cohesion and the size population and boundaries' of the proposed area.

Options for Consideration; have been prepared four possible outcomes to be put forward for consultations:

Option 1: Position to remain unchanged with the West of Waterlooville MDA being covered by the 2 existing Parish Councils.

Option 2: West of Waterlooville MDA be removed from both existing Parish Councils and a separate Parish Council be created for West of Waterlooville MDA.

Option 3: West of Waterlooville MDA be removed from Denmead Parish Council and amalgamated with Southwick and Widley Parish Council.

Option 4: West of Waterlooville MDA be removed from Southwick and Widley Parish Council and amalgamated with Denmead Parish Council.

Following the conclusion of the review, if a new Parish or other Council is to be created, or if there is an imagination this will be done by way of a Reorganisation Order. The Order can be made at any time however the order should take effect on 1st April following the date on which it is made. In this case if a Reorganisation Order is made this will be in June 2018 and comes into effect 1st April 2019.

The consultation will be taken place with residences of Winchester CC.

Funds for the Community

This is probably my last call for applications this financial year as applications close at the end of January. I have a small budget for funding community related projects across the Division. For example, I have funded Lunch Clubs; Church group; trim trail for a school; music stands and theatre equipment for a school, playgroups; youth groups; Christmas party for village children; trips to the theatre for Golden Years; trips to the pantomime for young people, etc. The group must have a Treasurer and a bank account. I look forward to hearing from you.

Energy Savings

Hampshire County Council is making energy savings by replacing 75% of light fittings in its buildings with low energy LEDs. The light replacement project is part of a wider energy saving programme which has seen the County Council reduce its carbon emissions by 38.1% since 2010 – saving around £30 million in energy costs in total.The Council are well on track to reaching their 40% carbon reduction target by 2025, with the ultimate aim of being carbon neutral by 2050.

Hampshire Finances

You will know from my previous reports that, following a reduction in the Government's revenue support grant, inflation and the rising costs of social care, a total of \pounds 140 million savings have to be found by April 2019. Council is now considering proposals for achieving this and Government is being lobbied to allow charging per visit at household waste and recycling centres [HWRCs]. If we were able to charge, the local authority could raise up to \pounds 4 million and this may prevent some HWRCs from closing. Hampshire currently provides more HWRCs than comparable authorities with almost 85% of the population currently within five miles of an HWRC. 26 HWRCs are listed on the Council's website.

Stay Well and Warm this Winter

As the weather turns colder, some people and families will struggle to keep their homes warm. Hampshire County Council's Hitting the Cold Spots initiative can help. Now in its seventh year, this county-wide fuel poverty project offers advice and support to people who are having trouble staying warm during the winter, including home visits, help to access funding for boiler repairs and replacements, temporary heating, and small grants for winter fuel emergencies. Hampshire residents can also receive advice about tariff switching and how to be referred to other services for further help, including 'safe and well' visits and healthy living advice.

A Career in Care

The County Council has teamed up with home-care providers to encourage more people to consider a career in care in order to help meet the growing demand. Care workers working for the County Council, or one of the care agencies it commissions, receive full training toward recognised qualifications, paid travel time between appointments, flexible working options and are paid at least the minimum wage, plus 20 per cent. Domestic Abuse

A reminder that anyone affected by domestic abuse can get help. The Integrated Domestic Abuse Service for Hampshire (IDASH) is funded by the County Council and the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner and offers confidential support to women, men, children and young people. Those affected can call 03300 165 112 to receive immediate information as well as referral to the most appropriate service for ongoing support.

In Hampshire, an estimated 44,000 women and 25,000 men experience domestic abuse a year, and one in four women and one in six men will experience domestic abuse in their lifetime - often with years of psychological abuse. Domestic abuse has far-reaching effects on individuals, families and whole communities.

Support is also available for people perpetrating domestic abuse in Hampshire through the Domestic Abuse Prevention Partnership (DAPP) which engages with them, reducing risk to victims, and improving long term outcomes for children. Both men and women may perpetrate or experience domestic violence and abuse. However, it is more commonly inflicted on women by men. Those people who are, or think they may be, abusing someone can contact DAPP on 02380 009898 to get information as well as referral to the most appropriate support service.
