ear Friends,

During March it is noticeable how much the hours of daylight are increasing in our part of the world; indeed, we shall have nearly 13 hours of daylight in the day by the end of the month, roughly two hours more than we had at the start. It is this lengthening (of days), represented by the Old English word lencten and Middle English word leynte, which has given us our modern word Lent, the season which Christians traditionally recognize as a period of simplicity and reflection in preparation for the remembrance and joyful celebration of the death and resurrection of Jesus at Easter. Lent echoes the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness, tested to his limits, as he resisted all of the devil's temptations in preparation for his earthly ministry.

We can't expect to match up to Jesus' powers of self-denial and integrity, however hard we try. His perfection is surely something to aim for but we ought not to despair when, in our human weakness, we fall short and give in to some of the things which tempt us in our daily lives. Neither should we give up trying just because we know that we find it impossible always to resist. For God neither values nor measures things in the same way that humans tend to do and his grace and mercy are everlasting.

In 2019, Bishop Emma Ineson wrote a book called Ambition: What Jesus said about power, success and counting stuff which looked at how Christians might understand success, but very shortly afterwards a global pandemic struck, and success suddenly began to look very different. This year, Bishop Emma has written a sequel called Failure: What Jesus said about sin, mistakes and messing stuff up. In his foreword, Archbishop Justin Welby says, "Failure is human, universal and inevitable. The question is what we do with it and, even more importantly, what God does with it in partnership with us. I

importantly, what God does with it in partnership with us. Emma Ineson brings us face to face with God, who knows what a failure is and is not, and whose greatest love overwhelms the greatest failures. God sets a different scale for measuring success and failure, and the Bible is, above all, a story of failure redeemed, failure forgiven and failure overcome in resurrection and merciful judgement." This book, in a humorous, realistic and non-judgemental way, looks at sin, guilt, human nature, the failure of the church and the greatest 'failure' of

all, the glory of the Cross. I particularly like the title of the final chapter, How to fail really well, and look forward to getting some useful tips when I reach the end of the book.

... doing things which can make a positive difference in the world But Lent is not only about giving things up and reflecting on where we might have gone wrong and how much that matters, it is also about being active and doing things which can make a positive difference in the world. Things such as being good neighbours by giving generously to support the work of aid agencies, particularly those presently helping to bring relief to people suffering because of the recent earthquakes in Turkey and Syria and to people suffering because of war in Ukraine. And things such as being good stewards by supporting organizations which work for the protection of the natural environment, wildlife and habitats. Why not, for example, join a local Wildlife Trust or other nature group this Lent? At this time of year, as days lengthen and warm up, vegetation begins to grow and creatures to stir,

this can be a rewarding experience as well as a worthwhile commitment.

On 19 March this year we take a break from the apparent austerity of Lent to celebrate Mothering Sunday. This is a day on which we are called to remember our mothers and to give thanks for all that we have received from them; acknowledging that, for some people, who haven't had a good or fulfilling relationship with their mother, it may be a father or some other significant person that they wish to remember and to thank. It is an occasion to celebrate the importance of family and relationships and how these influence our lives, and to pray for the mending of broken relationships and protection of strong relationships. God calls us to live in community, loving and caring for each other, and Mothering Sunday is a day when we can give special thanks to God for all those people who have played a significant 'mothering' role in our lives, including those in our church family.

This Lent, whatever we find ourselves doing, may we all fail well.



Denmead Walks

This walk starts at Denmead Community Centre and is guite a long circular route over some high ground so great views will be enjoyed from several points around Hambledon. A welcome break can be taken on benches both in the churchvard and on Speltham Down.

Leave Denmead Community Centre CP by the main entrance, turn R and head up School Lane. Bear R into Thompsons Lane and at the top of this road pick up the FP on the other side of Uplands Road, on LHS of 'Wimborne.' Emerging from this narrow FP cut diagonally to the R across the field, then keeping to the path alongside the hedge continue to the far end. After passing through the gap in the hedge go diagonally L on the FP across the field before dropping downhill through a narrow copse while aiming for the metal gate which borders the B2150 road into Hambledon.

A short distance from the gate bear L toward the electricity pylon going slightly downhill before passing through two gates between which is a narrow plank that acts as a narrow bridge across a stream that is fast-moving

after heavy rain and during the winter months. Note that this section can be impassible following prolonged heavy rain. After negotiating a third gate take care crossing the lane that connects Hambledon to Worlds End then head up through the fields opposite passing

through three further gates. At the final gate, which borders Madam's Copse, follow the FP through the woods to Menlands Lane; here turn R heading downhill on the metalled surface.

At the junction of Menlands and Cams go L, then after a short walk uphill turn R going over the first of three stiles. At the end of this section that runs along the gardens of a number of houses, turn L at the junction with the FP leading from the centre of the village and continue uphill to the gate made from a recycled pallet.

Enjoy the view toward the centre of the village and the church (see photo) while walking across the top of the field. Take the fourth track off to the L into the woods (yellow FP sign on fencing,) immediately pass a former marl pit on the LHS, then continue straight ahead through the woodland eventually exiting the same through a gate.

Keeping to the RHS adjacent to the hedge, another gate is about 100m ahead. After passing through this gate go L under trees which are part of Litheys Hanger. Further on is yet another gate followed by a wide flat field with East Hoe Manor on the RHS. Look for a double finger

post on the far side of the field and head in that direction.

On reaching East Hoe Road, turn R and after passing the entrance to the manor house grounds go around a double bend. Once again there are views to appreciate (see photo) to the R while heading downhill

toward the main road. On reaching the latter, take care in crossing onto the bridleway slightly to the L and carry on



through this rather overgrown section until a junction is reached.

Turn R at the junction after passing around a metal barrier and head downhill enjoying the wide expense of farm land either side of the wide track. Again, go R at the next junction and walk along Green Lane as far as the crossroads at Three Corners. Go across the road, then, after about 30m, bear L into

Church Lane heading back toward Hambledon passing Windmill Down Farm part-way along.

Some distance further on pass the local primary school on the LHS and immediately afterwards go R into the churchyard before heading diagonally downhill to the L on the path. (A break can be taken on a bench just inside the entrance to the churchyard.) On leaving the churchyard head downhill toward the local convenience store and on

reaching the latter take the road opposite

immediately heading up Speltham Hill.

Where the lane bears L, go R through a gate onto Speltham Down; ignoring the gate on your LHS walk about 200m along the flat section at the bottom of the field before going through a gate to the L and heading uphill. Partway up this track there is a bench on the RHS, then a little further up the sloping path exit the Down through a gate. Continue on the FP for about 80m to the end of the low hedge on the RHS then turn L going through a narrow copse into a field. Stay on the LH side of the field and eventually come out onto the lane that connects Hambledon with Rushmere.

Turn L at the lane then almost immediately R onto Wayfarers Walk. A little way along in fenced off woodland is an unusual feature – a metal press. Now bear L around the perimeter of the field. Stay on the L after passing through the hedge into a second field, at the end of which bear L; after a further 80m go R at the lane.



Stay on the lane passing the junction at Rookwood and finally emerge onto the B2150 at Forest Gate. Care is needed crossing this busy road after doing so turn L and head along the pavement. After passing the entrance to Uplands Road, remain in the same direction heading back toward the community centre which is at the bottom of the hill.



Community Impact with Denmead Scout Group

As many of you know we have a recycling centre at the Scout Hut. As a group we actively promote recycling and looking after the world around us.



The recycling centre is run by a few dedicated volunteers who empty the bins and box up the contents to be sent to the various collection points. If our youth members come and help, they earn themselves a badge for their camp blankets

We are currently collecting the following:

- sweet wrappers
- biscuits wrappers
- cheese wrapping
- Babybel wrapping
- pringle cans
- coffee packaging. (Not |ar or pods.)

Since we started in 2019 we have recycled over 1500kgs of waste that would otherwise have ended up in landfill. Plus 5 full pallets of books and numerous boxes of bras and glasses that we don't need to weigh.

We also have 2 clothing banks in the car park which provide vital funds for the group alongside the benefits of recycling.

If there is not a bin for it we don't recycle it, so please take it home! It costs us a small fortune to have our refuse bins collected each year and we don't want to fill the bin with other people's rubbish. Please do not leave toys.

We have also run 2 very successful Swishing evenings, where people can bring along clothing they no longer wear and swap them for someone else's unwanted items. These have proved popular, and we are planning another one for summer clothing in May.







The Beauty of Winter at Denmead Horticultural Society

For our February talk, Ben Pope drew on his art college training to open our eyes to the beauty of the garden in winter. This is a time to assess how well the design works, to consider creating movement, a visual path along curved or straight lines from one space to another. Ben used pictures of the garden where he works to beautifully illustrate his theme – hedges of box and yew clipped to cloud shapes, a curving path lined with miscanthus leading to a sunken garden, domes of clipped beech. Consider where the low winter light is coming from to backlight trees or create shadows, reflection from water surfaces and use of repetition and false perspective. Ben showed us many plants that look good in winter: sculptural seed heads, flowing grasses, winter flowering shrubs and early bulbs – so much to see and appreciate when visiting a garden in winter or to include in our own gardens.

House Plants – many of us will remember the rubber plants, cheese plants and spider plants in macrame hangers of the 70's. Now a new generation are discovering house plants and there are so many lovely varieties to choose from. Our next talk is by Liz Penman, owner of house plant shop Rose Clover in Southsea who will introduce us to her plants, tell us about the conditions they are suited to and how to look after them. She will bring plants and lovely pots to tempt us to try something new. Talk at 7.30pm on Tuesday 7th March in the Church Hall, visitors welcome £2.

DVA Uncovers Past Secrets

The February meeting opened with the Chairman advising of his enthusiasm for the Denmead Village Association to integrate with other local organisations and asked members to 'spread the word'. He outlined the various village activities planned to celebrate both the coronation and DVA's 50th anniversary and then offered the members a quiz about Denmead and its history, which showed just how much – or how little! – some of us know about our village.

The Chairman outlined several planning applications which had been put forward and encouraged members to look at the Neighbourhood Plan website. Patricia Stallard then described the proposals which had been put forward in terms of traffic calming on Forest Road.

It was then the turn of our speaker, Mark Seaman, to tell us of the Secret History of Stansted House Estate with Mark's specific interest being in archaeology. Due to much of the estate being covered by woodland and the ground covered by undergrowth, it is extremely difficult to detect signs of earlier habitation. However, with the use of LIDAR (Light Detection and Ranging), which works by bouncing laser lights from aircraft, a great deal

of information can be gleaned. A Roman road between Chichester and Arundel has been found, there are barrows on Old Winchester Hill and many sites have been unveiled on the Stansted Estate. These include some World War II corrugated iron underground shelters, a Canadian training school for those defending the coast between Portsmouth and Dover, an 18th century cricket pitch and a secret garden. Spread around the estate are sawpits and, in all, Mark described ten different 'secrets' on the Stansted Estate which LIDAR had helped to uncover.

District Report

The way in which we cast our vote is changing due to an increase in fraud.

Voter Identification - each person who wishes to register as a voter must first have a Voter Authority Certificate issued by the local authority (WCC), this was launched on 16th January this year. Voter ID is expected to be in place for the elections taking place this year on 4th May although it will not come into force for a UK Parliamentary General Election until October 2023. Private areas will be available within the polling stations to produce ID if requested. Only the presiding officer and poll clerk can inspect the ID unless permitted by the elector. The presiding officer must refuse an elector a ballot paper if they have reasonable doubt about the ID with a refusal being final and cannot be questioned.

Absent Voting - those people who have previously had a Postal Vote will be required to re-register in order to vote at the coming election in May, the application will be valid for three years. Changes to the three yearly application process will be transitional starting from January 2024. Postal vote application and new proxy limit is expected to take effect from August 2023.

Online Absent Vote Applications & Verification Electors will be able to apply online for an absent vote. Both online and paper applications will include a request for the applicant's ID to be verified. Online application service is estimated to be available from August 2023.

Accessibility ROs will have a general responsibility to take all reasonable steps to support voters with disabilities. The provision for voters to be assisted by a companion will be extended to allow anyone over the age of 18 and is expected to be in place at the May 2023 elections.
