Lent is a season of waiting. This can be a problem since most of us don't like to wait.

Because of our aversion to waiting we pick the shortest line at the grocery store. We get impatient when traffic is backed up, when the bus is running late, or when the internet takes more than a second or two to load our favourite website! And I'm no different... I often get annoyed that my rapid-boil kettle isn't quick enough!

As I write this letter, in just a few days I will be heading into hospital for major surgery, and thereafter will follow six weeks or so of waiting. My weeks of extended sick leave tie in beautifully with Lent, and so for me, I shall be forced to lay down my plans, my goals and my 'business' and instead resume a position of helplessness and dependency. I will need great patience – Chris, my husband, even more so!

Life has the tendency to force us to wait whether we like it or not. Such seems to be the situation of the Psalmist in Psalm 130. Out of one of the deep and difficult moments of life, the Psalmist cries out to God. We don't know what kind of situation the Psalmist is dealing with. It might be stress of the emotional, psychological, physical, or social kind; it's not clear.

O LORD, HEAR MY VOICE; LET YOUR EARS BE ATTENTIVE TO MY PLEA FOR MERCY. - PSALM 150-2

What is clear is that the Psalmist has confidence that God is always listening.

According to the Psalmist, no deepness is too deep that God cannot hear our cries. Even those deep dark places

that we dig ourselves into, those places of mess - our "iniquities," as the Psalmist puts it, are not so deep that our cries cannot be heard. God is forgiving. God's 'hesed', or steadfast love, will not waver.

With this confidence, the Psalmist waits.

Note what the Psalmist does not ask for he doesn't ask God for answers. There is no request for some sort of sign that things will be alright. Remarkably the Psalmist doesn't even ask for a response or for God to do anything. The Psalmist can rest in the knowledge that God is listening. From the midst of the depths, the promise of God's presence is enough.

When we look out at the people in our world and in our churches, we see

those who like the Psalmist are crying out from the depths: victims of violence, crime, and injustices of all sorts. Parents awaiting the return of their prodigal children. The chronically ill, those who experience sudden loss and those who fear the future. This is sadly a long list.

Unlike the Psalmist we do want a sign. We want a response or for God to just do something. While God does sometimes respond in these ways, more often it seems we are left with nothing to do but wait. As we sit in these moments of waiting, the Psalmist reminds us that sometimes all we have is God's presence. This, in and of itself, is enough. God hears us, cares for us, and promises to never abandon us.

The Christian tradition teaches us that one day God will do something. All the wrongs that have ever been committed will be righted and all the pain and weeping we have suffered will be no more. Until then, we wait.

In this season of Lent, where we wait for the death and resurrection of our Lord, may we also look ahead and trust that Jesus will once again fulfil our waiting. The God who raised Jesus from the grave will restore, refresh, and renew this broken world. Until that day, which we watch for with an eagerness like those who wait for the morning light, we wait with the comfort that God is waiting with us.



And so, whatever your situation – busy, active, purposeful, or perhaps lonely, isolated, and uncertain can I encourage us all to return to God will all our hearts, to wait patiently for Him – and to discover afresh His mercy and grace...

Then as we reach the very last week of March, we will journey through Holy Week,

remembering Jesus' suffering, passion, and death. Those final days in which it looked like all hope was gone, darkness had won. Intense and poignant days of waiting...

Until, miraculously, Jesus rose from the dead, beating all evil and sin, triumphing over all guilt and shame. Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life. As we place our hope and trust in Him, claiming His Victory, our waiting will never be in vain.

Ally Chatterley, Operations Manager at Citizens Advice Winchester District gives advice on dealing with damp and mould in a rental property.



Q Damp and mould is building up in our house. Our living room is the worst and there's a strong smell, so we've stopped having friends round. We're also concerned about our health. We've reported it to our landlord, but they haven't done anything. With six months left on the occupation contract, we're running out of options. What should we do?

A You've done the right thing by bringing this to your landlord. To work out if they are responsible, you'll need to find the cause of the damp and mould, but this can take time unless there's a clear cause, like bad insulation or a leaking roof.

Damp is when an area of your property doesn't dry out, often because it's cold. The main types are rising, penetrating, construction, and condensation damp. It can lead to mould, which is a fungus that grows in areas where warm damp air condenses on cold surfaces, like window frames. Information on our website can help you work out what type of damp you have, who is responsible and what you can do.

You should also check your written statement for mentions of repairs and damp. Your landlord is responsible for fixing a damp problem if it's making your home unsafe to live in. For example, this could be if it's affecting your health or the health of those you live with.

Your landlord will also be responsible if the

damp is related to repairs they should have carried out, like if the window frames are rotting. They would have to cover the cost of repairs to any items damaged by the damp, including carpets and furniture.

Condensation is a key cause of damp we're all familiar with. Keeping homes well-heated and well-ventilated is the best way to prevent this, but for many of us today, high heating costs and cold weather are making this very difficult. If you're finding it hard to insulate and heat your home, check our website to see if you're eligible for support.

Always avoid doing anything that can make damp worse, as it may affect whether the landlord takes responsibility for repairs. Our website has advice on what to avoid, like drying clothes on heaters, blocking air vents, or using portable gas heaters.

You may reach the point where you just want to get out of your occupation contract early but remember this can be very tricky and there might be things you haven't tried yet. For example, if your landlord is responsible for the damp in your home but doesn't do anything, there are steps you can take, like reporting them to the local authority. And as a private renter, if you've got evidence from a health professional that damp is making you ill, you may be able to get free legal advice through Legal Aid.

The DVA Reminisces

January's speaker at the Village Association, Chris Deane, who has lived all his life in Denmead, talked about the Restalls shop, which many members could remember and showed a book which included a Restalls family tree dating back to the 18th century.

In 1902 Gerald Restall took over the Post Office and it then became the village grocery store in the premises we now know as South Downs Funeral Service and Glasstec. Between 1975-8 Chris was the 'shop boy' and paid 22p an hour! The Post Office was on the right of the premises and on the left was an Off Licence, further to the left was the butcher and further on fruit and vegetables with the bakery on the opposite side. Just as nowadays, the chocolate was near the tills! On the opposite side of the road various shops have changed over the intervening years; the Co-op used to be a haberdashery but the Fish & Chip shop is still the same. Restalls closed in 1991 following which the premises were empty at various times despite an application to build a threestorey block of flats, which was declined. Terry Norman, a cousin of the Restalls, has written three books recording the history of the village, one of which is sold by DVA.

His brother Cecil is listed on the village war memorial.

During the meeting the Chair advised that, in terms of the Newlands development, Barratts has accepted responsibility for the poor road surfaces and will commence the work shortly and complete by Christmas. He then informed the members of a new book to be published by DVA by Martin and Judith Lewis, who have created a book of 30 walks around Denmead. This will be available at the next meeting, when Martin will be speaker and will introduce the book. (One of these walks is currently featured in each edition of the Chronicle – see pages 30-31.)

Future plans include; the May speaker will be a 'Cyber Champion' and will advise on how to protect against cybercrime. The events committee will also be arranging several activities throughout the year, and the association is also looking for people interested in joining a drama group and is planning a car boot sale as well as a visit to Hampshire Records Office.

Why not come to the next meeting in All Saints Church Hall at 7.30pm on 15th March to hear Martin's tales about his walks. Annual membership is £8 with the first visit free.

HCC Appeals for Loving Homes

More than 5,000 New School Places

A proposed major investment of £242 million could create 5,312 extra school places in Hampshire by September 2027. HCC has set out its proposed capital projects for Children's Services over the next three years, which include

- eight new schools
- two new special schools
- two school expansions

 seven projects to increase provision for children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) in existing schools.

In total, proposed new schools and expansions represent £199 million of the overall £242 million. The additional school places would contribute to a total of 19,989 new school places since 2013.

Places for pupils with special educational needs and disabilities remain a key focus of the capital programme, with two new proposed special schools in the pipeline including one in Whiteley which, subject to final approval, would be funded by Government following the Council's successful bid to the Department for Education (DfE). Additionally, over £6 million has been earmarked for proposed projects to expand SEND provision at seven existing schools by September 2024.

Other projects to be funded by the capital programme, subject to approval, include access improvements in schools and other modernisations across existing buildings, as well as projects for children's social care and early years settings.

Green light for changes to School and Post-16 Transport Policies

Changes designed to make HCC's School Transport Policy more flexible and responsive to individual children's needs have been given the seal of approval. The changes are not part of a savings programme and do not include any changes to the eligibility criteria for the service.

One of the key proposals agreed is the introduction of Personal Transport

In these circumstances, the provision of a Personal Transport Budget could enable families to create more tailored transport arrangements better suited to their children.

The provision of Passenger Assistants (PAs), who accompany eligible children with additional needs on their school journeys, will now also be reviewed regularly to ensure the right support continues to be given. This could benefit those children currently without a PA whose needs have now increased and, likewise, those with a PA who have become more independent and no longer require this level of support.

As with most Local Authorities, the Post-16 Transport service requires a partial financial contribution from parents with the majority of the costs funded by the Council. This contribution does not apply to families on low incomes or in exceptional circumstances and, in 2022/23, was waived for 76.7% of families eligible.

The agreed increase in the parental contribution for Post-16 Transport will be applied annually, in line with inflation, from September 2024. It will also apply to other discretionary transport services for school age children such as Spare Capacity seating, which enables families with children who are not eligible for funded statutory transport to pay for spare seats on transport contracted by the Council where they are available. Again, this change is not part of a savings programme and there are no changes to the eligibility criteria. Denmead Walks

The route of this walk is similar to Denmead Walk 20 but in the opposite direction and a little shorter. It traverses sections of Wayfarers Walk and Monarch's Way yielding very pleasant views from the WALK DETAILS Distance 6.15km/3.8 miles Duration 1h 35m Walk Grade MODERATE (3/5) Stiles 2

high point after turning off Pithill Lane and again when crossing Sawyers Hill.

Leaving Kidmore Lane car park go R up the lane then turn L into Cemetery Lane. Continue past the burial ground then turn R. Keeping the small bungalows on your LHS and cemetery the other side the path soon bears L but on emerging with the field ahead go R. Proceed along Wayfarers Walk as far as a gate where a footpath

from Harts Copse comes from the L.

I.Ikm/0.7 mile After passing through the gate remain in the same direction eventually reaching a second gate that leads onto Mayswell Lane. Here go L then after 30m turn R into Harrowgate Gate.



2.28km/1.4miles Take the L fork uphill on reaching the junction in front of Pithill House



Pithill House I: Wayfarers Walk with Kidmore Lane. The lane turns L partway up the hill at the top of which go R on a wide farm track.

2.7km/1.7miles Enjoy the view down into the valley and take time to look back toward the Solent while walking along the crest of the hill. After 400m bear R downhill keeping the line of trees on your LHS. If the footpath is indistinct as the tree line finishes, head in the general direction to the L of the last tree at the bottom of the hill. (See figure 2)



3.5km/2.18miles Go over a low stile onto Harrowgate Lane at the junction known as Fiveways then take the path uphill obliquely to the R over Sawyers Hill.Again, pause when climbing up the hill to admire the stunning views on the RHS.

4.3km/2.7miles After the greenway has progressed downhill for some distance look out for a gap in the hedge on the LHS (this is almost directly opposite a metal stile on the R.) Go through the gap following the direction of the yellow footpath sign. Bear L on reaching Crossway Lane and continue to the junction at the end.



4: Crossways Junction

4.77km/3miles Reaching Crossways Junction walk around the white house before picking up the FP on the RHS just before the Edneys Lane sign. Go over the very low stile and walk across the well-marked FP that eventually emerges onto White Horse Lane opposite Little Denmead Farm.

5.2km/3.25miles

Turn L onto the lane and remaining on the metalled surface after 400m branch R into Tanners Lane. At the end of the same turn L into Kidmore Lane; the car park is a short way along this lane.

District Council Update on Voting, Tax & Planning

Voting procedures for the upcoming May Elections

Postal voting

There are changes to voting by post. If you have a long-term postal vote that you applied for before 31 October 2023, this will now expire on 31 January 2026. The electoral services team at your local council will contact you before your postal vote expires. You can apply online to vote by post and will need to prove your identity when applying. You also need to reapply for a postal vote every three years.

Council tax 24/25

At the time of writing the only document which has been published to-date is The Scrutiny Committee Report. The report is comprised of several papers to form the main budget proposals: Housing Revenue Account (HRA) Budget, General Fund Budget Capital Investment Strategy and the Treasury Management Strategy, all will have been put before the Cabinet on 8th February for approval.

Housing report is proposing an increase in Council Rents of 7.7%.

General Fund – the Financial Plan shows that in two years the council will show $\pounds 2.9m$ gap in funding. There is already a Transformation Challenge 2025 (TC25) which will see a transformation of council services following a review of each of the council departments to identify savings.

Capital Investment Strategy – Subject to Council approval it is proposed to spend close to \pounds I m on projects within WinchesterTown in 2024/5.

It seems likely that the proposed Council Tax increase for the coming year will be the maximum allowed by Central Government but this will have been agreed at the end of February. Confirmation will be reported in the April edition.

Planning Enforcement is still of great concern with Denmead Ward having in excess of over 30 open cases and this is growing at a rapid rate, many of the open cases are getting quite old and may run past the date in which any action can be pursued.
